St Bernard's NEWSLETTER November 2020





On behalf of the team at St Bernard's, I hope everyone enjoyed the half term break and that everyone is well. The children have returned refreshed and are continuing to make pleasing progress. This half term, we are re-introducing connector lessons and the children are enjoying learning new knowledge and skills. Some examples of learning are included later in the newsletter.

As face to face whole school gatherings for assemblies or celebrations are not permitted at present, we have now got into a routine of virtual assemblies during the week. We're committed to ensuring that Covid-19 doesn't disrupt key events which makes St Bernard's the place it is. Each Team continues to pray together daily and we join as a community for our virtual learning awards each Friday. Miss Reid regularly reads to the whole school whilst the children enjoy a biscuit. To mark Remembrance, Team 6 produced a beautiful display and video for the rest of the school to engage with. We also celebrated Children in Need virtually and will engage in virtual whole school assemblies for Anti-Bullying Week. With Advent and Christmas approaching, initial plans for whole school events are included later in the newsletter.

As mentioned in previous newsletters and especially given the current national lockdown we are in, the safety of everyone in our school community remains our key priority. Our stringent risk assessment continues to constantly be reviewed in relation to guidance received regarding Covid-19. I'd like to remind all parents that face coverings need to be worn when entering the school grounds unless you have provided myself or Miss Reid with an exemption reason. Thank you for your support with this. If the exemption rule applies to yourself, please take extra precaution to distance yourself from others when you come onto the school grounds. Please remember to only enter the school office if absolutely necessary. If you are coming into school, you must wear a face covering.

Please remember that if your child is ill or displaying symptoms of Covid-19, you must not send them to school. This is also the case if anyone in your household is displaying symptoms. In both cases, a test will be required and must be returned as negative before your child can return to school.

Whilst in school, if your child becomes unwell with a new and persistent cough or a high temperature, or has a loss of, or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia), they will be sent home and you'll be advised to follow <u>'stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus</u> (<u>COVID-19</u>) infection, which sets out that they should self-isolate for at least 10 days and should arrange to have a test to see if they have coronavirus.

In the event of your child having to stay at home to await a test result or isolate, our home learning strategy will begin. This is outlined in our October newsletter available on the school website.

As always, thanks for your ongoing support and we look forward to achieving lots of success with the children in the run up to Christmas.

Attendance

I'm delighted to inform you that we are currently achieving our target of 96% +. Current attendance figures per class are provided. Please note that these figures do not include Covid related absence such as isolation. Every lesson is essential for your child's development, even more so given the amount of learning time lost due to the previous lockdown. Please ensure that your child is in school at their designated time so that they can get cracking with their first lesson. As a school we are closely monitoring and tracking the attendance of all pupils alongside our Educational Welfare Officer and there will be review meetings for parents where a child's attendance falls below an acceptable level for reasons other than Covid.
