We use the book 'Home' by Carson Ellis to think about what makes a home. Children in Year 5 and 6 use Benjamin Zephaniah's poem 'Melting Pot' as inspiration for their own poems, talking about what it means to be British.



As a Rights Respecting School, we explore the rights of a child, linked to being a refugee.
